



- Jail Tax/Expansion in Washington and Benton Counties/NWA voted down
- 6,400 signatures collected toward 8,000 needed for ballot initiative
- 2 bills introduced & run in the legislature: juvenile fines/fees & ending misdemeanor cash bail
- Advocacy in Benton & Washington Counties resulted in applications for Mental Health Court funding


